

OFFICE OF THE CHIEF

The mission of the Sioux Falls Police Department is partnering with the community to serve, protect, and promote quality of life. Our mission statement strikes at the core of who we are and what we value. In 2021, we operated with an authorized strength of 280 sworn police officers and 316 total staff. Our partnership with the community is vital to maintaining a safe city and we continually look for better ways to engage citizens and encourage them to work with us to increase public safety for everyone. Our department understands that without the continued support and trust of our community, our public safety mission would be very difficult.

2021 was an interesting and eventful year. We continued to deal with the evolving global pandemic, working through the peaks and valleys of this disease. We saw a substantial decrease in homicides from 13 to 5 in 2021. While other parts of the country were experiencing surges in crimes, we saw decreases not only in homicides but also in aggravated assault, simple assault, robberies, and a few other crime categories. The Sioux Falls Area Drug Task Force continued their vital work to the community. Record amounts of fentanyl and cocaine were seized, and near record amounts of meth were seized in 2021. Despite the record amounts of seizures, we also had a record number of overdoses and overdose deaths, highlighting the importance of a community-wide response to deal with this issue. In 2021, 128,196 calls for police service were received. The city population grew by an estimated 7,000 people in 2021, pushing our population over 202,000. The continued growth of Sioux Falls and the metro area presents both challenges and opportunities for our department, but despite the growth in population and calls for service, our property and violent crime rates per 1,000 residents remained relatively stable.

The men and women of the SFPD are well-trained, focused, and dedicated to providing a high level of customer service and public safety. The City Council gave approval in 2020 for a new Public Safety Training Center for both the police and fire departments that will provide a state-of-the-art facility for years to come. We had the privilege of breaking ground on that location in the fall of 2021 and look forward to its projected opening in 2023.



TRAINING

In 2021, the Training Section worked to ensure the Sioux Falls Police Department reached its staffing potential. This included hosting and graduating two academy classes: the 177th and 180th. There were five new hire classes this year, which is two more than are usually trained. This was made possible due to the implementation of the CORE (Certified Officer, Reciprocity-Eligible) program, which allowed the department to take advantage of the tumultuous political climate nationally. Two CORE classes were hired in 2021 which significantly bolstered the department's staffing.

In 2021, the department armorer, Brent Booth, was able to test and implement reddot reflex sights on all of the Uniformed Service Division patrol rifles. His research, testing, and implementation was completed well ahead of schedule, and will improve the response capability and rifle marksmanship capabilities of our department as a result.

2021 saw the implementation of a string of building improvement projects that will keep the Law Enforcement Center operating for the foreseeable future. The east parking lot was completely repaved, with multiple sections being completely replaced. This was the first of the two-step process for replacing the aging parking lots. 2022 will bring even more improvements to the Law Enforcement Center.

2021 was the busiest year on record for the department's training staff. The training staff met the goals and challenges set before them through their hard work and dedication to their craft and because of the assistance from the department's Investigative and Uniformed Services Divisions. All of the accomplishments of the Training Section were made possible through a strong, multidivisional team effort.

RECORDS

Change was a common theme for the Police Records Division throughout 2021.

In July, the Sioux Falls Humane Society and local veterinary clinics in Sioux Falls were transitioned from paper to an electronic licensing process. With collaboration from the City IT and Finance teams, use of the Customer Self-Service application in Energov was implemented among all

clinics to issue animal licenses in the City of Sioux Falls. Ultimately, this transition decreased spending for the Sioux Falls Police Department and increased efficiency between the clinics, Finance, and the Records team.

Over the years with the evolution of software systems, data has been stored in various systems. In 2003 and 2004 when the department transitioned from the AS400, some reports were placed in the Papervision system, while others remained in the AS400. When conducting record inquiries, employees are required to search multiple systems that include: microfilm, the AS400, Papervision, and the Central Square Records Management System (RMS). In an effort to enhance the efficacy of record searches throughout the department, a contract was signed with Central Square late in the year to convert the arbitrary records from AS400 and Papervision into the Central Square RMS. This transfer is expected to occur in 2022 and will promote competency in Records, while eliminating annual fees for multiple record keeping systems and the need for IT to preserve the AS400 storage.

Teamwork between Records and Parking resulted in transferring the data entry of police parking tickets to the Sioux Falls Parking Division. This transition alleviated some duplication between departments



and included the requirement for Parking employees to become National Crime Information Center certified (NCIC). This certification ultimately empowered Parking to complete tasks independently from the PD. Records continues to provide support to Parking as needed, and still maintains the entry of all city snow tickets.

In December, City Facilities employees removed a wall in the Records section. The open concept now allows for an allencompassing workspace and promotes a "One Team" environment among employees.

After 44 years, our most tenured employee, Karen Roemen, retired after working exclusively in Police Records. Karen's work history made her the second-longest employee of the City to date.



UNIFORMED SERVICES

In 2021, the Patrol Officers in the Uniform Services Division continued to work closely with our residents and our agency partners to make Sioux Falls a safe place to live, work, and visit. These men and women are the first to respond when our community is in need. This is a 24/7 mission that all embrace and are committed to completing.

To provide service to our ever-growing community, we are deploying our three patrol shifts at nine different start times throughout the day. This provides an overlap in personnel to closely match call volume by time of day. Answering over 120,000 police calls-for-service this year over a ten-squaremile area has led to constant re-evaluation of operations to do the best job for the residents. This year, the Shift Commanders worked with a team of officers and sergeants to find the best possible staffing solution. The goal is to provide the best public safety while improving the working conditions for our personnel. I am very pleased with their efforts and know that this will provide our residents with the fast response times they deserve and improve

the work/life balance for our officers. In 2021, we opened our Southwest Report to Work Station. 21 officers report to work from this facility, improving initial response times to the southwest quadrant of Sioux Falls. This also created much-needed parking and locker space at the Law Enforcement Center.

I am privileged to work with an amazing staff. Our officers are the most highly trained and experienced personnel in the region and the public deserves no less. Our supervisory cadre is made up of sergeants with a broad array of experience who are commited to lead, develop, and motivate their personnel. Our three Shift Commanders bring nearly 60 combined years of experience to our department. They are strong leaders who are dedicated to our public, their officers, and the success of our public safety mission.

We are ever grateful for the heartfelt support of our citizens. It is our privilege to continue to serve and protect them in 2022!

Shift 1 provides all essential patrol services to the city during the hours of 5 a.m. to 6 p.m. These officers are responsible for four quadrants of the city. The deployment of officers comes from historical call data that places officers closest to the areas that see the most calls for service. This serves to decrease response times and increase customer service.

Aside from patrol activities, officers handle community-based policing projects that identify and address the needs of the public. These projects focus on enforcement, education, and community policing. Officers use a variety of patrols including marked and unmarked cars along with foot, bike, and UTV patrols to police the areas that require the most attention. These teams aim to reduce crime and maintain public confidence and trust.

A main point of emphasis on Shift 1 has been visibility and approachability. During busy daytime hours, officers focus on both bike and foot patrols where citizens convene for business and recreation. Primarily this occurs in the core of the city, but also in adjacent city parks and greenways. Officers know the root of community policing starts with accessibility and relationship building. Shift 1 officers responded to over 75,000 calls for service in 2021. Each one of these contacts was an opportunity for officers to place a strong emphasis on creating and maintaining positive relationships with those they serve. Community partnerships and community engagement help officers to accomplish their goal of keeping the community safe. These open lines of communication helped Shift I solve crimes and work toward a safer community.

Shift 2 officers have made community policing a priority in the areas of Sioux Falls where they serve. Officers from the afternoon shift often partner with home and business owners to find ways to address issues in their areas. The relationships between officers and community members have helped strengthen the bonds within the community and provide a different way for citizens to express concerns in their neighborhoods. Officers used foot and bike patrols as alternative ways to proactively handle crimes in the core areas of Sioux Falls.

The call volume on Shift 2 is the highest percentage of calls-for-service for the uniformed division, mainly due to the time of day that is covered by the afternoon hours. Shift 2 officers are supported by overlapping ten-hour shifts from morning and night shifts. This allows for a better coverage and call handling during the peak call times of the day.

Utilizing other deployment options such as twoofficer cars, bicycle patrol, and foot patrols allows for better response time and unique coverage to different types of calls for service. Shift 2 officers participated in several community-orientated policing events throughout 2021. Officers assigned to Shift 2 worked with the community members to make events such as National Night Out, Badges and Friends, Coffee with a Cop, and other events a success. Shift 2 officers assisted other community partners with the homeless count and continue to build relationships with downtown businesses.

Over the last few years, there was a dramatic increase in disorderly conduct and panhandling crimes in the core area of Sioux Falls. During 2021, Shift 2 began several proactive patrol initiatives where officers addressed those disorderly conduct and panhandling crimes. An increase in education, enforcement, and community relationships helped officers concentrate on the activity and continue to work to find creative ways to address those issues while providing alternative to the community members engaged in the activity.

Many of the officers and sergeants on Shift 2 are members of a variety of specialty teams within the department. The teams include the SWAT team, Mobile Field Force, Crisis Negotiation Unit, Tracking Team, Peer Support, Crisis Intervention, Recruitment Team, Police Officer Training Program, Training Cadre, and others. The dedication from these officers help strengthen the skills of the shift and the rest of the department.

While most of the citizens of Sioux Falls are sleeping, Shift 3 officers are awake and hard at work protecting life and property during the overnight hours. Without hesitation, Shift 3 officers respond to calls ranging from mundane nuisance calls to violent crimes in progress. Officers on Shift 3 utilize community policing principles as well as working closely with businesses and homeowners to address concerns within their areas of responsibility. By gaining the support of the community through being visible and working with them to problem solve, we are able to make neighborhoods safer for all.

When a crime trend is noticed in a certain area of the city, the issue is addressed head-on by allocating multiple assets from different sections of the department to saturate the area with enforcement. During the summer months, the annual Safe Streets initiative in the Pettigrew and Cleveland Heights neighborhoods resulted in arrests for narcotics, weapons violations, and various other nuisance crimes. Our commitment to those sometimes troubled neighborhoods remains a top priority and enforcement efforts will continue.

The excellent dining and nightlife available downtown continues to draw large numbers to the district. Shift 3 officers assigned to the downtown area remain focused on keeping it a safe and fun place to visit. Over the warm summer months, additional officers were added on Friday and Saturday nights to work foot patrols across downtown. Regular walkthroughs of open businesses and bars were conducted and countless positive contacts were made with visiting patrons. As downtown flourishes, we will continue to deploy additional assets to maintain the safe and inviting environment both residents and visitors currently enjoy.


STREET CRIMES UNIT

OPERATIONS

The Operations Section is comprised of the School Resource Officer (SRO) and Community Resource Officer (CRO) Programs. This past year was a year of growth with the addition of the new Jefferson High School and Ben Reifel Middle School. The SRO unit also grew from 14 officers to 15 officers and two sergeants. The SRO program continues to provide police coverage to over 60 school buildings in the city of Sioux Falls and works with seven distinct school districts.

This year SROs Healy and Ragland further developed CORE Sioux Falls. CORE is a middle school-based program where each school selects two students a month to join their SRO for lunch, shopping, and a haircut or style at a local salon. This program demonstrates how it empowers students with self-esteem, confidence, and self-worth. During the summer months the SROs take on various roles to assist with the mission of the

SFPD. The hit of the summer was entertaining kids at the hydrant parties.

Throughout 2021, the CROs continued to build relationships and partnerships across our community. The Community Ambassador Program grew from 11 members to 17 members. These members represent diverse populations from across Sioux Falls and assist the PD with building relationships at community events. The Mental Health CRO position continues to foster and grow our relationship with Southeastern Behavioral Health. Each week they go out into the community to offer behavioral health services to those in need. The CROs organized numerous events such as Coffee with a Cop, National Night Out, Badges and Friends, Cast with a Cop, and participated in several festivals. This year, CRO Brady Lieuwen was awarded the SFPD Clark Quiring Award for Excellence.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Support Services again had another incredible year in 2021. The Support Services section is made of SFPD Day and Night Traffic Officers, SFPD Parks Officers, the SFPD K9 Unit, and the SFPD Traffic Crash Investigators.

While each of these individualized units have specific duties, they also all work together as a team on a myriad of things across the city to keep the residents of Sioux Falls safe.

In 2021, the day and night Traffic officers were responsible for 183 DWI arrests, 11,875 total citations (Traffic, Parking, and Warnings), including 4,720 speeding citations. The Traffic officers also helped with 335 funeral escorts. Along with this and the help of others in the unit, they also assisted in over 20 home/building moves within the city.

This year the Parks officers were busy as well. During the course of the year, they assisted with over 130 events that occurred within the city limits throughout the year, all while patrolling over 80 parks in the city. Along with the events, Park officers worked with organizers of 49 assembly permits granted throughout the year.

The number of fatal traffic crashes investigated by our Traffic Crash Investigators dropped to 7 in 2021 from 11 in 2020. The investigators were involved in investigating one fatal industrial accident as well.

The K9 Unit was blessed with the addition of K9 Hugo this year, who passed his certifications and is out patrolling Sioux Falls with his handler Officer Van Voorst. All of our K9s passed their certifications and the K9 team assisted in training many other department K9 teams from across the state.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Sioux Falls has the best trained, equipped, and staffed Animal Control team in the state of South Dakota, yet the program continues to look for ways to prepare for the future. One area that was lacking was the ability for Animal Control to respond to large-scale disasters, neglect, or hoarding situations.

In 2016, Animal Control applied for and received a grant from the ASPCA Midwestern Disaster Resiliency Program for \$14,000 to purchase an enclosed 8.5-foot by 24-foot enclosed trailer. In 2017. Animal Control received an additional \$4,000 grant for portable kennels, and the program has since been stocking the trailer with needed supplies. The Sioux Falls Area Animal Emergency Trailer is insulated and equipped with air conditioning, interior and exterior lighting, 94 animal kennels, and a gas generator. It contains supplies for responding to a natural disaster such as a tornado, and also to extreme hoarding or neglect situations. The trailer was first deployed in 2019 during the Sioux Falls flooding events.

In September 2021, the Sioux Falls Animal Control team was requested to assist the South Dakota DCI and the Sioux Falls Area Humane Society officers with an extreme animal neglect case over 90 miles from Sioux Falls. Animal Control responded to the scene with two officers and the Animal Emergency Trailer. The team found a multitude of malnourished and mistreated dogs, some running loose, while others were confined to buildings and staked outside. Some of the dogs were permanently chained to steel fence posts with only a bare ramshackle dog house for cover. Most of the dogs didn't have access to food or water.

A total of 48 dogs were taken into custody, of which were 3 emaciated nursing female dogs and 17 puppies. Transporting 48 dogs would have been a logistical issue without the assistance of the Animal Emergency Trailer. All of the dogs are now being cared for at the Sioux Falls Area Humane Society while the owner goes through the court system. The Animal Emergency Trailer magnifies Animal Control's response capabilities in a disaster.

HONOR GUARD

The SFPD Honor Guard consists of 14 members that represent the SFPD in ceremonial functions across the region. This year Honor Guard members attended law enforcement funerals in Iowa, Minnesota, Illinois, and South Dakota.

Early in 2021, the SFPD learned that Iowa DNR Officer Steven Reighard passed away while being treated in a Sioux Falls hospital. The Honor Guard offered assistance and organized a multi-agency escort for a proper send-off for Steven.

In May, the South Dakota Law Enforcement Memorial ceremony in Pierre was reinstated after COVID. The SFPD took the lead in organizing this ceremony which involved Honor Guards from across the State.

In November, the 12th Annual Project Blue Light Ceremony was held at The Empire Mall. The team folded a flag and presented it to The Empire Mall in honor of their 10th year of support for Project Blue Light.

SIOUX FALLS POLICE DEPARTMENT UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEM TEAM

The Sioux Falls Police Department Unmanned Aircraft System (UAS) Team consists of five FAA Part 107 certified pilots. Currently, there are four aircraft that can be utilized in different situations depending on the needs of the mission. This year, police were able to supply Sioux Falls Fire Rescue with two aircraft to use as the SFFR begins to build a program. Police and SFFR will work closely to train and respond to emergencies where a UAS would assist units in the field. For 2022, goals

include outfitting a dedicated UAS response vehicle and to add several pilots to the program.

In an effort to keep the citizens of Sioux Falls apprised of the use of this new technology, a policy is in place to notify the public via social media or press release each time the aircraft fly. The flights are also reported in the department's annual report.

INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

CRIME LAB

NOTABLE EVENTS:

This past year has been another busy and productive year in the Crime Lab. We are currently fully staffed with six Forensic Specialists, three Police Evidence Technicians, and two part-time employees. We are currently revamping our work area to allow for improvements in our personal work spaces, areas of privacy dedicated for meetings and employee break times, and improvements in an area that is dedicated to forensic processing and evidence viewing. Tabletops in the officer evidence drop-off area and the evidence property area have been replaced with stainless steel to provide a more sanitary work space.

ACCREDITATION:

The Crime Lab successfully maintains ISO/IEC 17025 accreditation in the areas of controlled substance and toxicology through ANAB (ANSI-ASQ National Accreditation Board) and no nonconformances were found by the auditors in 2021. The Crime Lab is preparing for a site assessment in February 2022.

WORK PRODUCT:

The Crime Lab had another very productive year in 2021. The Crime Scene unit responded to over 390 calls for service. The Controlled Substance discipline (drug testing) analyzed over 1,650 samples this year, and three additional specialists were qualified to perform Phase 1 controlled substance testing. The Fingerprint section completed over 85 cases and processed more than 260 items of evidence.

The Crime Lab's Property and Evidence Section was responsible for maintaining over 135,000 items of evidence and overseeing all incoming/outgoing evidence throughout this past year. The Crime Lab also collected and properly disposed of over 1,660 pounds of prescription drug medication through the department's Prescription Drug Takeback Program.

CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS I

The Crimes Against Persons (CAP) Section of the Investigative Services Section investigated five homicides in 2021. This was a decrease from the record high 13 homicides that happened in 2020. In three homicide cases, arrests were made clearing the case; another case was cleared by death of the offender; and one homicide case is under investigation and review by prosecutors.

Three new detectives joined the CAP section: Detective Seth Meier, Detective Cole German, and Detective Morgan Black. New detectives receive extensive mentoring and training on how to investigate the varied cases assigned to the CAP Section.

CAP Detectives work closely with the Minnehaha County State's Attorney's Office, Child Protection Services, Child's Voice, Children's Inn, Compass Center, Rape & Domestic Violence Abuse Center, Minnehaha County Domestic Violence Council, South Dakota Network Against Family Violence, Suicide Prevention Task Force, and the Minnehaha County Coroner's Office. CAP Detectives and supervisors are also instrumental in providing training to the Sioux Falls Police Department as well as other agencies, businesses, and community organizations throughout our city and state.

During 2021, the CAP Section investigated approximately 7,593 cases and 263 Department of Social Services Child Protection referrals. The number of cases CAP investigated in 2021 shows a slight increase from the cases investigated in 2020.

The Sex Offender Registry Detective currently has 959 registered sex offenders within our jurisdiction. This is approximately 38 more registered offenders then 2020.

INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

NARCOTICS

The Narcotics section and the Sioux Falls Area Drug Task Force (SFADTF) had yet another very busy year in the Sioux Falls area. The SFADTF focused investigative efforts to all levels from low-level to large multi-state drug trafficking organizations. In 2021, the SFADTF seized over \$384,000 in U.S. currency and property as a result of their investigations. During 2021, there were 2,658 investigative cases, 544 operations, 159 search warrants served, and 39 firearms seized.

Methamphetamine, marijuana, and cocaine are the top three drugs that narcotic detectives encounter. In 2021, the SFADTF seized over 129 pounds of methamphetamine, 136 pounds of marijuana, and 157 pounds of cocaine. The 129 pounds of methamphetamine is just shy of the record 133 pounds seized in 2019. The 157 pounds of cocaine is a new record.

Overdoses continue to significantly affect the Sioux Falls area. The SFADTF has three detectives assigned to investigate all accidental overdoses. The majority of overdoses were opioid- or methamphetamine-related. Sioux Falls saw an increase in overdose calls going from 64 in 2020 to 76 in 2021. Overdose death investigations also increased from 20 in 2020 to 29 in 2021. The majority of opioidrelated deaths were due to ingestion of the deadly synthetic opioid fentanyl. The SFADTF was able to successfully investigate several fentanyl dealers in the Sioux Falls area and hold them accountable. The SFADTF seized over 2,000 grams of fentanyl in 2021. This was a new record and fentanyl investigations will remain a priority of the SFADTF.

PROPERTY CRIMES I

PCS/FRAUD:

The Property Crimes Section comprised of property crimes and fraud detectives had another very busy year, investigating 10,536 cases. This was an increase of 612 from 2020.

Stolen vehicles continued to increase in 2021 to record-setting levels. In 2021, the Property Crime Section investigated 1,337 cases of stolen vehicles, an increase of 214 from 2020. The overwhelming majority of these cases are vehicles that were unlocked with the keys inside the vehicle. Detectives, along with Public Information Officer Sam Clemens, worked on educating the public in hopes of reducing the numbers of stolen vehicles.

The Property Crimes Section investigated an increasing number of cases involving firearms being stolen from unlocked vehicles. Detectives, along with Public Information Officer Sam Clemens, have sent out numerous educational reminders about securing firearms inside of a residence and not leaving them unattended.

In 2021, the fraud section investigated several cases of phone, email, and various frauds pertaining to gift cards and crypto currency. Scammers have been contacting victims through various means claiming to be law enforcement, the IRS, or the Social Security Office, then demanding gift cards or crypto currency to take care of nonexistent warrants or debt. Detectives, along with Public Information Officer Sam Clemens, have worked on educating the public in hopes of reducing the number of victims.
